

## NOTES FROM THE BOARD MEETING

The Board of Directors met on October 19 in Clubhouse 3 and on Zoom at 3 PM. The entire Board was present along with Manager Louanne Hughes. The Board approved the minutes from the September 21 meeting; they also approved the August financials. The August and September financials are available in the Association Office.

The Board approved Dick Duffy for the Finance committee.

President Cliff Cole discussed the 2022 Budget. He tabled the Budget proposal since several vendor contracts are coming in higher than expected. The Board approved to table it until November. Resident Shirley Cassa asked him to identify the vendors. Cliff responded that the painting and landscape contracts are higher.

Vice President Jim Czizik made a motion to approve the IGM contract for the golf course. The Board approved.

Director Diana Lee Van Boerum submitted the properties for the Fining Appeals Committee. The Board approved.

Director Bob Wilt discussed the situation with the 6 city streets which have excessive outside traffic. He said in 1984 we lost 64 parking spaces where the medical building is. He has evidence that these streets were to be used for community, police, and fire department, not commercial traffic. Director Diana Lee Van Boerum is concerned about maintaining the bridges on 2 of the streets if we own them. Vice President Jim Czizik said that the City does not have the information that Director Bob Wilt has. He said there are no documents that state the City owns the streets. Director Don Ernst asked about the speed bumps. Bob said the Board must investigate why we don't own Clubhouse 1 and the golf course but pay taxes on them. He is investigating the Campanella and Caldor leases. The next step is getting an attorney involved.

Secretary Nancy Price said we need a Nominating Committee for the 4 Board openings in 2022. Volunteers should submit their names at the office. If more than 5 volunteer, names will be pulled from a hat at the November Board meeting.

Director Hal Eide discussed the need to purchase the land once discussed. He said we need to change the Documents so we can spend more than 25K. Resident Janet Dixon said that between 2008-2016, we tried to buy the land. Treasurer Jim Browning said he looked at this issue about 4 years ago. Three lawyers said no. Jim read from the Documents; he concluded that purchasing this land is illegal. Resident Steve Schone said that the lawyer, Randall, advised that we could not buy the land; there was no legal way to do this. President Cliff Cole said council told him we could buy the land with approval of 75% of the community.

Resident Louise Farrell questioned the dirty roofs. Louise and Julia Palmer explored 30% of the community and found dirty, very dirty, and black roofs. She said Coastal is supposed to pressure wash the roofs every 2 years. President Cliff Cole said that Coastal only gets paid when they power wash. He said this issue has been a sore topic for the Board and Management. Manager Louanne Hughes said the contract with Coastal has changed: first 2-year power wash, 3 year paint the roofs; then 6 years paint and 2 years power wash; last, Coastal began using Sherwyn Williams paint. Management has been trying to get Coastal to meet the contract. Presently they are power washing sections 5 and 5A. Both Cliff and Vice President Jim Czizik agree the roofs look terrible and Coastal has been non-compliant.

## Landscape Committee News

Residents Lawns are looking good in the Neighborhood. The Irrigation Sprinkler upgrades have made the biggest improvement this year, the lawns are GREEN year around. Seasonal residents coming back will starting Fall planting. Tis the season for growing flowers and vegetables in Florida. The humidity drops which helps us tending the gardens very happy.

When making changes to the plants in your yard you are required to complete an application form and submit it to the office. A landscape member will review the application inspect the property and approve or advise you on your planting request. Not required for current flower beds and changing seasonal flowers.

Here are ways to keeping your property well maintained year around. Seasonal Residents please have your property maintained during the summer. Check your property for items such as:

- ▶ Bushes growing above porch railings.
- ► Weeds overgrown in foundation plants and flowerbeds.
- To many plants in pots only 10 per property, max 5 per side of house.
- Trees only 2 per front and back, none on sides of home unless corner lot.
- Plantings at lamp post must be kept 1 foot below light.
- ▶ Patio privacy hedge no more than 6' height.
- Norfolk Island Pine Trees (Christmas tree looking pine) CAN NOT be planted in the ground.
- Banana Trees are not permitted. Existing bananas limited to 5 trunks maximum.
- Coconut Trees are not permitted. Existing trees younger than 5 years old could be required to be removed.
- Royal Poinciana trees are no longer permitted. They have an invasive root system and wide canopy area.

Florida is a tropical climate many plants grow that are not native to this area.

These are considered exotic or invasive plants. The list can be found at www.FLEPPC.org NOTE: Some plants are poisonous to pets and people. For more information on local landscape recommendations go to www.SFWM.org look for TAB or booklet Waterwise. FPL also has Tree Planting Information. If you cut down or remove a tree, you are required to replant one. Keep the planet cooler, provide shade, and absorb excess water.

## **CARING NEIGHBORS' CORNER**

**CIVILITY** – In 2013, when Caring Neighbors was conceived, the small group of residents involved had two major concerns. The first was to keep alive the volunteerism that animated a previous generation of residents who had served community needs over the years. The second concern was to promote the civic spirit of Leisureville, especially during a time of mounting polarization and tension in public life. It was the vision of the founders of Caring Neighbors that the organization would bring neighbors together in activities of education and mutual support that would strengthen the health of participants and enrich our life together. The leadership of Caring Neighbors continues to be motivated by these ideals. Our programs are geared to those ends. As a new "high season" begins, with the return of "snowbirds", and the welcoming of newcomers, we invite you to look forward to programs of interest, and to offer your skills and talents in promoting the civic spirit of Leisureville.

THE GIFT OF LIFE – On Monday, November 15th, between 8am and 2pm, the Blood Mobile will be stationed in the R-3 parking lot to accept donations of whole blood or platelets. It is estimated that if all eligible blood donors gave three times a year, blood



shortages would be rare. According to the Red Cross one donation can potentially save up to three lives. Consider joining with your neighbors in sharing the "gift of life". Mark your calendar!

**A BIG QUESTION –** Last month's meet and greet, which featured representatives from two local service agencies, addressed one of the most difficult situations facing members of a 55+ community: **recognizing when one is no longer able to manage on one's** 

own. A culture that prizes independence and self-reliance is slow to acknowledge the need for help. It's often a painstaking decision. Fortunately, the speakers at the October gathering provided valuable guidance on the resources available when a resident begins to confront the question of "what next?". Leah De Cicco from Barrington Terrace Senior Living laid out the "residential facility" options available: independent living in a supported senior community; assisted living for those with some assistance needs and skill nursing care for those with age-related or medical needs. A second speaker, Brie Hurley of Lantana based Expicare, provided an overview of "in-home" services. She emphasized the advantages of choosing a state licensed home-health agency for home care. Licensing assures that services are regulated, bonded and insured. Speakers also referenced possible sources of financial support. An important take-away: consult an eldercare lawyer when exploring options and resources.

## Golden Age Of Hollywood - Marlene Dietrich



Born 120 years ago on December 27th, Maria Magdalene Dietrich was born in Berlin. Marlene was probably the first femme fatale on screen and her biography declares that it was her smoldering sex appeal and sultry voice that made her one of the most glamorous leading ladies throughout the 30's and 40's. Her father, a policeman, died when she was just 4 years old and her mother remarried a Cavalry Officer.

Marlene, a polyglot, was fluent in French, German and English. Her early aspirations included the violin, but by her late teens Marlene gave up music to pursue acting with Max Reinhardt's drama school and soon landed parts on stage and in German films. The fact that her family disapproved of her acting gave her the impetus to change her first name that was a combination of her first and middle names.

In her early 20's, Marlene married for the first and only time to Rudolf Sieber who was responsible for her landing a part in 1923's *Tragedy of Love.* The two would have one child Maria after just a year, but the couple later separated but never divorced.

It was in 1930 in Germany's first speaking film *Der Blaue Engel* (The Blue Angel) directed by Hollywood's Josef von Sternberg that propelled Marlene to international fame. The film was shot in German and English using all the same cast members. Marlene's character, Lola Lola the nightclub dancer, would propel her meteoric rise to fame. In the plot an aged local professor gives up his career just to have a relationship with her. The depiction is noteworthy as the professor humiliates himself with little regard to his standing among his peers in pursuit of her.

Not wasting a moment after the film's release Marlene moved to America, and Sternberg cast her that same year in *Morocco* as a lounge singer with the up-and-coming Gary Cooper. Accentuating her newly installed star status as a femme fatale, Dietrich has the two male stars, which included Adolphe Menjou, vying for her attention. The film garnered Marlene her first and only Oscar nomination. The film caused a sensation and had 4 Oscar nominations including one for director Sternberg. Her next big splash came in *The Scarlet Empress* in 1934 in which she portrays royalty as Russia's Catherine the Great. The actor-director duo would complete their collaboration in 1935's *The Devil Is a Woman* which was the star's personal favorite. It was in this celluloid epic that Marlene vamps

## Death of a friend

The year was 1961 when I met Paul J, Sevigny. Looking back, it seems so long ago. JFK was president, establishing the Peace Corps, while the "Freedom Riders" tested the US Supreme Court. Elvis sang "I Can't Help Falling in Love with You," while Patsy Cline had a big hit with "Crazy,". The Tokens sang "The Lion Sleeps Tonight." We also enjoyed Andy Williams sing "Moon River."

After meeting Paul, we quickly became friends. I never heard him use profanity, even when no ladies were present. He was only 13 when his father died. Being the oldest of 4 siblings, he became the man of the house, helping his mother in many ways while working part-time after school.

Paul never complained about life's injustices. He worked as an

it up captivating several of the male stars and dropping them cold.

Never to be typecast, Dietrich appeared in 1939's *Destry Rides Again* with Jimmy Stewart in a lighthearted comedy as a saloon girl. In 1940 she teamed up with John Wayne for three films *Seven Sinners* in 1940, *The Spoilers* in 1942 and *Pittsburgh* also in 1942. The two were linked romantically and when that affair cooled, they managed to remain lifelong friends. Marlene in *The Scarlet Empress* impressed the American born Chinese actress Anna May Wong and their friendship endured as well.

Marlene had strong political convictions and when the Nazi's asked her to perform in propaganda films, she turned them down in ferocious fashion. In fact, Marlene renounced her German citizenship and became an American. She and renowned director Billy Wilder created a fund to assist Jews and dissidents to escape to the United States.

Never to be sexually typecast either, Marlene never hid her open bisexuality. In fact, Marlene would often attend underground drag balls in 1920's Berlin and in Hollywood; she referred to them as the 'sewing circle'. Actor Klaus Kinski had a lurid tale about his girlfriend and Marlene which I won't go in to here. She also gave the first lesbian kiss in her first film *Morocco* wherein she appeared clad in a tuxedo. Normally considered great rivals, Greta Garbo and Dietrich also were rumored to be lovers, confirmed by the detailed accounts of Garbo's anatomy and undergarments by Marlene.

Marlene married her husband in 1923 and the escapades between the two and invited guests continued for much of her life. The plethora of lovers included Errol Flynn and his wife, George Bernard Shaw and even John F. Kennedy. This list grows as she added Frank Sinatra, Gary Cooper, James Stewart, John Wayne, Ernest

Hemingway and Mercedes de Acosta. An interesting side note to all these lovers was the fact that Marlene suffered from bacillophobia, a known germaphobe, and cast members would refer to her as the Queen of Ajax.

Towards the end of her life Marlene would spend it in isolation refusing to be photographed and died in Paris in 1992 at 90. She was survived by her daughter and four grandchildren. Maybe one of the most articulate, outspoken icons of the Golden Age.

usher at a local movie theater. We never had to pay when Paul was on duty. One night the movie projector broke down. Paul was able to fix it, to the delight of the many patrons on that Saturday night.

A few years later, I bought my first house, a 3-family; I knew nothing about home improvements. Paul came to my rescue. He came over to our home with his wallpaper equipment and showed me how to wallpaper. We did 2 rooms, with Paul doing most of the work. I told him I hoped I did the right thing when I bought this house because having little money for a down payment, I had to take a 2nd mortgage, in addition to a home-improvement loan. He told me I better stay healthy, adding if I dropped out of the picture, "there would be another bank crash in Boston."

In 1969, Paul married Josephine Marino, asking me to be his best man. I was honored and gladly accepted.

Paul knew the value of an education from an early age. He earned a degree in Mechanical Design and later a Bachelor of Science and Engineering in Business. He also was a successful real estate broker who bought and sold homes, as well as a commercial building.

Paul was like a quarterback that never got sacked. He made the right moves, using common sense in his business involvements.

The years flew by quickly, as they always do. A divorced person can be viewed as sort of a 5th wheel. You know how it is; there is often little involvement with married couples. There was no contact for several years, which was my fault. However, when I learned they bought a condo in Naples, a few years ago, I called them, then visited. We enjoyed lunch at their Naples condo, while we rekindled fond memories.

Death always teaches us that our time on earth is limited, yet many of us fail to plan for it.

Paul Sevigny never looked for the extraordinary in life. I am sure he was content with the blessings that come from a simple life that is well lived, with over 50 years of marriage to his lovely wife, Josephine. He was a good man, a good husband and a good father. Among the ancients it was said that friendship was the highest form of love. How blessed I have been to have truly wonderful friends like Paul, for such a long period of time.

My dad, Peter Casa, a 20-year resident of Leisureville, passed Sept 26, 2021

He did it his way. Of course, his favorite artist and song is My Way by Frank Sinatra. My dad saw it all and lived life his way from 1923 to 2021.

He was born during the roaring 20's; it was a great time for America. He was raised during the

depression.

He served in WWII, honorably on the USS St Lo CVE63/VC65, an escort carrier in the Pacific Ocean. He fought with his shipmates in the biggest Pacific battle of WWII, The Battle of Leyte Gulf. His ship was sunk by the first Kamikaze.

After he was discharged from the Navy, he married his childhood sweetheart. He worked in NYC, where he was born, selling tools to construction workers. He loved his job and he was a great salesman and storyteller and made everyone laugh.

He bought his first home for \$10,000 in Elmont, LI, NY. He had 2 children, my older sister and me.




